# **APIARY UPDATE**

Our new ant resistant hive stands were installed at the apiary on Tuesday June 23rd.

Made from strong and sturdy, corrosion resistant stainless steel, the centre upright of each stand has a small reservoir which is filled with cooking oil.

Not only do the stands elevate the hives for easier access, the oil reservoir prevents ants from climbing up the stand and entering the hive.

Mounted above the oil reservoir is a flat sheet intended to prevent any bees present beneath the hive vented base boards from dropping into the oil.

We will monitor the effectiveness of the stands over the coming months as there are certainly still plenty of ants in the apiary enclosure.

# **CHANGES IN BEEKEEPING REGISTRATION**

## Effective as of July 1st.

Bees are amazing animals that play a critical role in global food security as well as providing income to professional beekeepers and enjoyment to hobbyists the world over. However, bees are under constant threat from a range of devastating pests and diseases, many that are not present in Australia, as well as the impacts of chemicals and pollution.

In NSW, beekeepers who own European Honeybees (Apis mellifera) must register with the NSW Department of Primary Industries (DPI). If you are a beekeeper in NSW, play your part in protecting our bee populations and the role they play in pollination by registering your hives. Compulsory registration helps prevent the spread of unwanted pests and diseases including Varroa and tracheal mites.

Through registration, the DPI can contact beekeepers and locate hives that may require treatment or inspection. They also offer registered beekeepers' regular information on biosecurity and training services.

The NSW DPI endorses the Australian Honey Bee Industry Biosecurity Code of Practice.

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The Code of Practice is based on the principles of good biosecurity and helps Australian beekeepers to protect the industry from pests and diseases. The standards in the Code are not onerous, they are things that all beekeepers should be doing to manage their hives.

From 1 July 2020, all NSW beekeepers are required to adhere to the Code of Practice as a condition of registration.

This means from 1 July 2020, as a beekeeper there are new minimum standards you need to meet related to:

- Inspections
- Disease management and reporting
- Hive construction, branding and maintenance
- Record keeping.

To help make this possible, NSW DPI:

- Is running information sessions on the Code of Practice so that all beekeepers can quickly and easily apply the code to their everyday beekeeping.
- Has prepared template beekeeping recording forms to help with your record keeping. You can download these here.

Compliance with the Code will deliver long term industry benefits by way of easier movement's interstate, increased access to public lands and improved pest and disease management.

Once you have registered, you will be issued with a Certificate of Registration. This certificate clearly outlines your conditions of registration and should be kept for future reference.

## What are the changes?

From 1 July 2020, it became compulsory for beekeepers registered in NSW to ensure their management practices meet the minimum standards outlined in sections of the <u>Australian Honey Bee Industry</u> <u>Biosecurity Code of Practice</u> (the Code).

Meeting these standards will not be a big change for those beekeepers who already manage their bees in line with industry best practice but for some it may be new so a summary follows.

## **Further information**.

The Australian Honey Bee Industry Biosecurity Code of Practice has been developed by the Honey Bee Industry Council (AHBIC) in collaboration with all states and territories to provide a national minimum standard for beekeeping practices.

The changes to NSW registration conditions to include the Code are supported by all beekeeping bodies in NSW through the Bee Industry Biosecurity Consultative Committee (BIBCC).

A number of resources and further information is available on the NSW DPI <u>registration webpage</u> to assist you with meeting the new requirements.

## A MEMBER'S STORY How another experienced club member helped her out

One of our new members, Annette and Stuart, (you've seen photos of their early journey over the last months in our newsletters) noticed their bees behaving differently and were perplexed by their behaviour. Luckily Ed Rixon, who has been a beekeeper for many years came to her rescue!

#### Here's Annette's story.

I had noticed for a few days that our bees were behaving differently; they were clumping together on the entry board to the Flow Hive. I thought they were hungry and so I made them a patty made from Custom Bee Feed. It was a patty made by making a syrup of sugar and water and mixing it with the bee feed.



I then rolled it out between two pieces of baking paper and laid it on top of the frames in the brood box. Their behaviour didn't really change but I could see they were enjoying the patty as there was paper in the tray of the Flow Hive.

A few weeks later I was cutting the grass with the ride-on lawn mower up against an old fence. I disturbed a swarm of bees in the grass! They were angry!

That night I went and had a better look. In the long grass was a swarm of bees. Three days later the bees were still there so I called Ed Rixon. Ed came the next day with a nuke. He had foundation in two of the frames.


