## PRESIDENT'S UPDATE

**Greetings fellow Beekeepers** 

On behalf of all members of Macarthur Beekeepers Association Inc., I start this month's report by expressing our most sincere condolences to Club Secretary Brett Matthew in the sudden passing of his wife on September 8th. Our thoughts and prayers are with Brett and family in this time of loss. Brett has resigned effective immediately in order to concentrate on family matters. Again, on behalf of the Club I would like to thank Brett for his diligence in assisting the Club as Secretary for the past two years. Brett, we appreciate all you have done and our hearts are with you.

In the interim, while the now vacant position of Club Secretary is filled, I have arranged for the Club Secretary's email and Club postal address to be assigned to me as Club President so Brett is not distracted by any upcoming Club correspondence.

On September 9th the NSW State Government announced changes to Regional NSW by altering lock down restrictions for areas other than 38 nominated LGA's. Unfortunately, these lessening of restrictions do not apply to Macarthur as we fall within the Greater Sydney Region which remains in lockdown.

Along with the rest of Greater Sydney and eventually all NSW, we will come under the NSW Government's announced "roadmap to freedom at 70% total vaccination".

The Club Executive will continue to monitor things as they change, however it is likely that future Club face-to-face events such as club meetings and field days will not only be limited to nominated group sizes in the short term but also, in line with the NSW Government's roadmap top freedom, will be restricted to those who are able to verify they are fully vaccinated. With this in mind, I would encourage all members to consider your vaccination status and along with the NSW Premier encourage any members currently not vaccinated to discuss vaccination with your GP and make a booking as soon as possible.

The October Field Day is highly unlikely to proceed. However, there is still an extremely thin hope we may be able to do something. Specifically in regard to Field Days, which historically have been oversubscribed, I am currently considering restricting the number of non-members permitted to attend an event and the number of events the same non-member may attend as a guest. I am keen to ensure that our membership fees provide a tangible and value-added benefit to members. I believe it is important to continue to welcome non-members to Field Days so they can see what beekeeping is about, however I do not feel that invitation should be open-ended.

The club has received notification of a number of swarms over the past few weeks with people requesting assistance. I remind members that the Club no longer manages an independent swarm catchers list. Instead, we direct people with swam queries to the NSW ABA Swarm Catcher site where they can enter the postcode where the swarm has been sighted and then contact the beekeepers registered as swarm catchers in that area. If any members are interested in registering themselves as swarm catchers, they can do so through the ABA site.



## **APIARY GOINGS ON**

Hi,

As we must stay at home in NSW, field days have been cancelled for the last few months, but we continue taking care of our Apiary for when restrictions are lifted and we are back to our field day activities. Bees have been complying with the 5km rule and haven't stopped gathering goods (fresh nectar & pollen).

As Spring is coming this month, it seems that the cold winter days are gone. With lots of sunny and hot days we should keep inspecting our hives, giving space for the queen to lay and adding boxes to store sweet honey.

There is a lot of nectar and pollen flowing into the hives, bees are really set for Spring, growing in population and bee boxes.

Perhaps it will be a wet spring, so be sure to keep small hive beetles under control.

September activities at the Apiary:

- Full hive inspection
- Hive swarming control
- Inserted new frames with embedded wax in the brood nest
- Added super for honey.

## **VICE PRESIDENT UPDATE**

Hello fellow members/friends,

I just wanted to share my little story on what happened to my Flow-hive over winter.

I left my Flow hive super on over winter which I have done for a couple of years now. I opened up the viewing windows on Friday 13th August and noticed an enormous amount of mould on them. As you can imagine I was quite concerned about this.



It was a lovely warm day so I decided I would open the hive to check all the flow frames and all the frames were covered in mould on the front end and back end. When I looked at the honey that was capped it looked wet, but it wasn't wet to touch. I removed the flow super straight away and closed up the hive again. I checked all the frames and they all had a good amount of wet looking honey on them.

I decided to inspect the brood box. On inspecting the brood frames the two or three frames that had stored honey in them also looked wet. I took them out and replaced them with new wired and waxed frames. I sent photos to Ed but he hadn't seen anything like it before and suggested I send them to James. As soon as I sent them to James, he rang me and said it was lucky I saw it and removed them when I did because it was small hive beetle that had nested in the honey and if I hadn't removed them, the huge amount of small hive beetles would have caused a slime out. I would have lost my hive. On closer inspection of the honey frames from the brood box I could actually see tiny little wormlike bugs moving around the frame.

I harvested the honey from the flow frames and you could smell that it had started to ferment so it all got thrown away 😞

Lesson learnt I will not leave the flow hive super on again and I have already added an ideal box on top of the brood box and I will leave this on next year for their honey supply for over winter.

My advice is that we have very knowledgeable people in our club. Don't be afraid to utilise them because if the first person you ask doesn't know or is unsure, they will always send you onto someone with more knowledge to help answer your question or help solve your problems.

## **EDUCATION AND BIOSECURITY UPDATE**

Hi everyone,

Spring is here and how strong are our hives coming out of winter this year? This spring inspection I had more bees in my hives than ever before! They are crowded even though I added space earlier, but they attacked for example an ideal box and finished drawing the comb and storing some nectar within 3 days. There were also swarm cells with larvae in 2 hives so I had to split them in a hurry. Unfortunately, I couldn't find the queen in one of them and even though I took 40% of the population out, they still swarmed the very next day. After going back on swarming day, I noticed I missed one tiny queen cell on one frame. This shows you that you have to be very, very thorough with your inspection.

So, if you haven't done your spring inspection yet please do so as soon as you can. Remember if there are lots of bees on the frame gently shake them off and thoroughly inspect each frame for disease, in particular AFB and EFB. If you are not sure about what to check for, refer to the AgGuide healthy bees which should be in your library. Members received a copy free of charge from the DPI.

You can find more info about what to do when inspecting your hive in my article from last month's newsletter.


## LIAISON OFFICER REPORT


## What is your current setup?

# Membership Renewal

Just another reminder that you would have received your email to renew your annual membership to the Macarthur Beekeepers Association Inc and The Amateur Beekeepers' Association of NSW Inc for the 2021/2022 year. After the 30th of this month you'll need to re-join the club if you haven't renewed your membership.

The new membership period is from July 1st 2021 to June 30th 2022.

# This pouch is made out of bioplastic that is compostable at home in 180-300 days.

Simply cut open and decant your honey into a jar.

Once you are done, peel off the label (we are working on compostable labels, but bear with us for a bit) and put the pouch in your compost or bury it in your garden.

If you don't have a garden or access to a compost bin, don't worry. Just return the pouches to us and we can do the composting for you.
