PRESIDENT'S UPDATE

Greetings fellow Beekeepers

Oh what a month it has been! The key word for the past month must surely be "swarms!" An incredibly high volume of requests for assistance for swarm collections made their way to the Club's Facebook page from all over the Macarthur region. On one particular day I counted eight requests for assistance. I have also heard of swarm collectors collecting so many swarms they were running out of boxes and frames, one person even resorting to fabricating a makeshift cardboard box NUC as a stop gap. Some of my own hives decided to stretch their wings and I am fortunate to have understanding neighbours who allow me access to their yard and trees to collect the girls and set them up in a new box.

In regard to swarms, some of the lessons learned for new beekeepers are: don't put off getting into the brood box, checking for queen cells, examining the brood pattern, providing brood box space, even making that split. It's really about what happens in the brood box which directly impacts swarm potential, rather than thinking that giving them the 'space' they need, by extracting some honey or adding another super, will be sufficient.

In doing our inspections Dallys and I have also taken the opportunity this Spring to re-queen some of our hives and I can honestly admit Dallys has proven herself much more efficient at queen spotting than I am.

In regards to, feedback to the club on the vacant position of Club Secretary, I received an offer from one club member offering to assist in a part-time capacity but admitting that once lock-down finished, their time to assist would be greatly restricted due to family and work commitments. With that in mind, and in the absence of alternatives, Rob, our current Membership Officer, has volunteered to cover the role up to the next AGM unless of course someone else with sufficient time makes themselves available. I do say thank you to the club member who offered the part-time help and also thanks to Rob for covering.

Lockdown for the 70% of NSW with double dose covid-19 vaccination status was lifted on Monday October 11th (audible sigh of some relief) and additional easing of restrictions when the State achieves 80% not that far away including the ability to resume regional NSW travel. We continue to monitor things as they change, and I will repeat comments from last month, it is likely that future Club face-to-face events such as club meetings and field days will not only be limited to nominated group sizes in the short term but also, in line with the NSW Government's roadmap to freedom, will be restricted to those who are able to verify they are fully vaccinated.



Hi everyone,

What got you interested in beekeeping?

Just knowing what bees do for our environment and how important they are to all of us was the main reason I decided to get a hive.

Finding out that within a hive you have different bees who have different jobs was so interesting. Their life cycle and how they forage for pollen and how all of that ends up being a raw honey to eat was amazing. Learning the difference between the Queen, Drones and worker bees and the role and life cycle each play was fascinating. Have been able to extract a few times now and my family and friends say that my honey is very clean, light and delicious. We are very lucky where we live to have such a variety of flowers around.

I have also an Instagram page called out.the.back.bees (because when people hear I am a beekeeper they ask- where are your bees??? so the name says it all). People follow my page to hear about my hive, see my products and learn interesting facts about bees and photos I display.

What is your current setup?

My hive is in my backyard in Kearns. We back on to a reserve so our bees are happy foraging around our local area. We have lots of natives around our yard as well as our lemon trees, mandarin trees and lavender just outside their hive. We have plenty of water sources around filled with rocks, twigs and sticks to protect them from drowning while they rehydrate.

We bought a nuc from Torsten last September and I have been able to extract a few times from it. We have 1x brood box and 1x super with 8 frames. My dad has also just bought his nuc from Torsten this month and so we have a brood box for him but we don't have a super just yet. We also have an epi-pen in case of emergencies. Mum and dad have been stung but they seem to like me and I have not been stung by my bees.....yet \mathfrak{S}

We have been to Fiji a few times and dad loves it – so probably there. But I did go on a cruise with my family... So I would like to do that again when we can.

Australia vs Varroa mite

What can Covid-19 teach us about varroa?

Covid-19 has made us acutely aware how fast pathogens can spread. A single case can be spread and turn into thousands more and, like varroa mite, it can be hard to spot. I think we all are aware that it is a matter of 'when' varroa reaches Australia, not 'if'.



It is estimated that 95-100% of feral bee colonies would die

if varroa reached our shores, and approximately 50-60% of recreational and semi-commercial keepers to leave the industry. This would severely impact our pollination capability, as well as honey stock. Commercial beekeepers would likely remain, but understandably the challenge and additional costs would impact their business.

We all understand the importance of testing for pathogens, like Covid-19, in our community. The same rings true for varroa. Regular testing is the most effective way to detect outbreaks in order to prevent further spread.

What is being done?

In some exciting news, bees have been imported into Australia for the first time in 20 years in an effort to be more prepared for the inevitable arrival of varroa. Australia now has a quarantine facility inside a compound in Victoria, which has been specifically built and designed for the importation of queen bees. The bees have been imported from the Netherlands and have a specialised cleaning behaviour which detects and removes varroa



mite from the baby bees before the mite is able to reproduce. For more information, I highly recommend watching the Landline (ABC) coverage on this, super interesting! https://www.abc.net.au/landline/bee-prepared:-importing-bees-to-help-protect/13450032

Top Feeder 8.5 L Complete Kit RRP: \$37.40

Comes with wooden surrounds to support feeder.

Top feeders are great for feeding raw or dry white sugar in the early and mid-winter. Feeding in this way, don't use a "chimney cap" and let the bees range across the feeder. If using dry white sugar you may want to add a small damp sponge to the top feeder to give the bees some moisture to work the sugar.



In the late winter/early spring you may want to feed a heavy syrup (2 kilos of white sugar to 1 litre of water, heated to fully dissolve). This shouldn't stimulate the queen to lay and with it being in a top feeder she shouldn't sense too much the sugar coming in. When feeding in this way, use a chimney cap to restrict the bees and prevent them from getting out in the bulk of the liquid. This will minimise drowning. If you don't have a chimney cap, you can fill the feeder with pebbles, or twigs, or some people use lots of polystyrene which will float and give the bees a place to sit above the syrup.
