PRESIDENT'S UPDATE

Greetings fellow Beekeepers

COVID-19: We continue to restrict face-to-face attendance at Field Days and our Club Meetings to those who are able to verify a fully vaccinated status.

Field Days - Though NSW Government restrictions on outdoor events such as our Field Day no longer mandate numbers (we fall under the 1000 attendees), we will continue to restrict the number of people attending to around 30 in order to ensure those who do attend will have the best user experience. Too many people inside the area of the apiary makes it difficult for everyone to participate and gain the experience they are seeking by attending. Because Field Days are very popular, we are restricting the number of non-member attendees to 8 (approx. 25%). We want to ensure our members are given as much opportunity to attend and participate as possible.

Club Meetings - From December, face-to-face attendance at club meetings will resume and we will continue with live streaming to maximise participation. The face-to-face attendance will continue to be managed through the preregistration system.

MCSL & Men's Shed: I recently had a catchup meeting with Helen from the MCSL and Roy, and a couple of others, from the Men's Shed.

Roy from the Men's Shed had recently watched a program on the ABC related to beekeeping and PTSD support for ex-service personnel. The Men's Shed was seeking to initiate some building activities along a similar line and basically wanted to know if we would be interested in partnering with them. They could assist people to build hives, and we could assist with beekeeping knowledge. More work to be done on a practical level but there are some possibilities. Discussion then expanded to cover more broad topics especially how the MCSL, Men's Shed and MBAi may better assist each other. I shared my personal concerns about current restrictions which had me looking at potential alternative locations for MBAi's apiary, e.g., cannot park our trailer on site, cannot park cars by the apiary without generating concern, unable to establish a portable building or container without going through the expensive process of submitting formal engineering drawings, DA etc which I feared would consume most of the club's financial reserve on paperwork, rather than any building itself.

A few ideas floated by Helen and Roy in particular were of specific interest to me.

- Adding MBAi to the lease arrangements with the Botanic Gardens, similar to the current setup with the Men's Shed (I need to see more detail on this).
- With appropriate training and initially possible Men's Shed representation, use of the Men's Shed facilities on a field day by MBAi when MBAi are assembling boxes, building and waxing frames etc.
- MCSL rearranging the fenced 'nursery area' at the rear of the Men's Shed to provide space
 for MBAi to position an ATCO site office or similar. The hut would have access to power
 and water (no WC) and therefore could be used to store equipment used on a field day, a
 venue for education on honey extraction, wax melting or other field day activities which
 would benefit from indoor space requiring power and water.
- In order to make improvements easier to progress, possibly relocating the MBAi Apiary slightly so that it resides within the boundary of the MCSL rather than the current location which is within the boundary of the Botanic Gardens.

I'm sharing this information with you as it was a positive discussion with potential to assist our club and also strengthen relationships with the Men's Shed and MCSL. There will need to be follow up both with Helen and Roy but we have started the process and I have shared these same details with our Club Exec.

Apiary Officer: James has informed me that due to pressing personal commitments he would like to step down from the Apiary Officer position some time in the New Year. Acknowledging this is a vital role in any beekeeping club, James is offering to buddy up with anyone interested in taking up the position next year to help them understand what is involved and also build confidence. It presents a great opportunity for an individual to provide a positive input to our great club! Brood Inspection: In chatting with a number of members they have expressed difficulty in conducting a brood inspection due to poor weather. As beekeepers, we are encouraged to inspect as often as necessary and have biosecurity obligations to conduct and document at least two formal full brood inspections each year, at a minimum of 4 consecutive calendar months apart. The weather will improve so be patient. My advice is not to panic, prepare all the equipment you will need for your inspection and have it

on standby so when the weather permits you can quickly take advantage of it and swing into action. Remember, if in doubt do not be afraid to ask for advice or assistance from your fellow club members.

Merry Christmas: I'd also like to take this opportunity to wish you and your families a safe and Happy Christmas and an awesome new year!



Planning a garden?

I do not have a green thumb at all, but as beekeepers it certainly is handy to know your plants, when to plant, how to design your garden, when they flower etc. I recently came across this AgriFutures document which would be very helpful for those thinking of making their gardens more bee-friendly.

It also has some really interesting facts that I would never have considered. As an example, unused railway reserves are a management concern for local authorities. Planting low-maintenance bee forage species may provide a low-cost means of controlling weeds, and providing an extensive resource for bees. So, did you know that Melbourne has 372km of electrified urban rail? If 50% of this rail was available, and assuming 5m of planting, this would provide an additional 93 hectares of dedicated bee forage!!! As well probably quite a pretty railway!

This document has certainly given me some ideas for my next garden overhaul!



Honey Pollen and Flora by Dr Doug Somerville RRP: \$192.50

Beekeepers have a new tool to keep their colonies healthy, with the publication of a landmark reference book by the Department of Primary Industries (DPI), *Honey and Pollen Flora of South-Eastern Australia*.

"Successful beekeepers understand the biology and value of floral resources which provide critical nectar and pollen to their bee hives, keeping them healthy and profitable," Dr Somerville said. "The book distils over 30 years of research and the real-world experience of hundreds of professional beekeepers, which will contribute to a substantial increase in floral understanding in apiculture." From *Acacia* to *Xanthorrhoea* species, over 500 plants are photographed and described for easy identification,



mapped, and given a star rating for their value to honey bees either as a source of nectar, pollen or both.

Plant species of value to beekeeping from southern Queensland, NSW, Victoria, South Australia and Tasmania are detailed in the book, which covers:

- What makes an ideal apiary site?
- Hive stocking rate
- Honey bee nutrition
- Star rating
- A note on flowering charts
- What's in a name?
- Describing plants
- List families genus/species
- Individual plant profiles


