Secretary Report

The roll up at the last field day at Pimlico was disappointing. Probably the main cause was a lethargy induced by the long period of hot weather. The next meeting is at Ruthven, and is a Forum on Small Hive Beetles, followed after lunch by the AGM. The beetles have been around for nearly 20 years now, and beekeepers have developed methods to deal with them. This is an opportunity to hear about the methods used by experienced beekeepers, as well as any new ideas or traps being tried.

The agenda for the AGM is attached. Besides the usual items like Presidents report etc, and the election of office bearers, it includes a move to alter the constitution, making membership of the ABA compulsory, and introducing an associate membership category. The committee unanimously support these changes, and asks you to support them too.

Update on Last Field Day.

The purpose of the field day was to expose club members to a vibrant young business, relying heavily on the new technology of the internet. Rob and Rebecca Blair-Hickman have such a business in Ballina Honey, right next to the Pacific Highway in Pimlico south of Ballina.

Rob decided to concentrate their activity on internet sales years ago, and he was the first beekeeper on eBay 12 years ago. This is ongoing and now internet sales comprise 65% of their business.

The business profile is different from what one would expect. Their priorities for beekeeping products are

- (1) Beeswax products
- (2) Honeycomb
- (3) Honey

In order to meet the first two priorities, the hives are managed differently from those of a conventional beekeeper. All wax is recovered. Honeycomb production requires the use of foundation frames, with limited use of recycled stickies. This leads to an emphasis on cleaning and recycling frames through the hives.

First, any wax is reclaimed from the frames using a melter oven. They are then boiled in detergent, followed by a chlorine water dip to sterilise them. After rinsing and airing, they are rewired with foundation and used a few weeks later. Rob said that this procedure is the best that they have come up with over the years. Rob gave members a demonstration of frame cleaning and a tour of his facilities. It was decided not to open any hives, as it was too hot.

Flowering Report

The welcome rain will probably have put paid to most of the Bloodwood in the Clubs catchment area, although I noticed that there was still a lot going at Lindendale last time I was there. It is finished here at Bentley. The Tee Tree/ Melaleuca is having a burst of flowering. These bursts will keep happening every couple of weeks probably till June. It is generally considered that it needs wet feet to produce honey, and it certainly has that. The trouble will be if the rain keeps on as it often does and washes out the nectar.

The rain may well set off some ground flora in paddocks that were almost bare. Scotch Thistle, Flatweed and Farmers Friend are all useful pollen sources and sometimes yield some nectar. I see some Ragweed responding to the rain, unfortunately. The pollen protein level is so low that it is regarded by some, including me, as being detrimental to the hive.

As I said last time it looks like an early year for Red Gum and Grey Ironbark, my estimate is around May.

From the Hives January 2020

Since the last report, there has been substantial rain in the district, partially breaking a long drought.

Some trees such as the swamp mahogany have been flowering, and the hives at Kyogle and Mongogarie have been bringing in some nectar. The hives have slowed right down, ejecting the drones and cutting back on brood. It would be worth feeding them if there was a honey flow in the near future, but the drought and hot weather have made the flowering of the trees unpredictable.

However, things are looking up; there is a good flowering of the broad leaf tea tree starting, and the hives will be moved on to that when the paddocks are passable.

Biosecurity

According to the last The Amateur Beekeeper, as part of a survey, each club is invited to send 100g samples of honey from three different apiaries for testing for AFB spores. Testing is free, and the details of the apiary are anonymous. You do get the results. Contact the biosecurity officer Ray Smith if you wish to participate.

Samples have to be in by 28th February.

Everyone should know by now that beekeepers have to report cases of AFB to the DPI via their website within 24 hours. The question arose at the last field day of how long does the beekeeper get after reporting to actually kill out the hive and make it secure from other bees. It was possible in the past to put the hive in a hospital apiary, kill the queen, and wait 21 days before killing all the bees, and closing off the hive. The beekeeper then extracted all the honey and radiated all the frames.

The answer at least after July 1st is 7 days, according to the experts.

The Male, and his Business

I don't suppose you knew this?

Therefore I caution Bee-masters against the unhappy Error of killing the Drones as fast as they can, for by this means they hinder their Breed, and damage or utterly destroy their whole Hives; but they had better kill six Honey (or female) Bees than one Drone in May or June; for 'tis as if they would encrease animal Creatures by destroying the Males: And indeed the Male or Drone is but short-life'd at best, therefore spare him, and he will make you amends. 'Tis a gross Error to say the Drones have loft their Sting; so grow idle, and live by robbing.

Forum On Small Hive Beetle

Are you troubled by small hive beetle? Have you had a Slime out? What can you do?





Come to the Forum on Small Hive Beetle and hear experienced beekeepers discuss these and other issues. What traps are best? What chemicals you should not use? Are traps absolutely necessary? How do you clean up an infested hive?

Small hive beetle came into Australia in about 2001, and appeared in the Northern Rivers a few years later. It is essentially everywhere in Eastern Australia now, and a major pest in our humid sub-tropical climate. It is also a significant pest in the USA, and inventions to cope with it have come from there and Australia. And they are still coming.

Beekeepers have been dealing with beetles for quite a few years, and now have considerable experience with different traps, in hive management, and in cleaning up infestations. A few of our club members have been around beekeeping throughout this entire period. They have been asked to give their recollections as well as thoughts about where the amateur beekeeping field is today.

The speakers are Ross Wood, a queen breeder, pollinator, and honey producer from Grafton, Geoff Manning, now mainly a pollinator from Lismore, Kevin Virgen, a honey producer from the Federal area, and Brian Window, a honey producer from Lismore. The speakers have been asked to address the following topics.

- What traps they have used, their problems and their effectiveness
- What killing mediums they have used and threats to biosecurity and beekeepers health
- How to clean up after a minor infestation
- How to clean up after a major infestation
- How have they changed their beekeeping practices
- Is there a connection between beetles and AFB?

There will be many different types of traps on display, and members are encouraged to show their own approaches. There will be ample time for others to contribute to the discussion.
