As it was far to inclement to inspect hives, the meeting evolved into a great question/answer and anecdote session. A lot of valuable information was shared together with a few laughs.

Steve Fowler demonstrated some easy and inexpensive techniques for separating honey from wax cappings. Also, how they treat and mould their wax. I had the opportunity after the meeting, to check out a system he has made using a stainless laundry tub. Talk to the Fowlers if you would like to follow up on any of this.

There was some discussion re marketing of honey. Many of us have our own clientele or market. It is important that only new jars or containers are used; ensure that the honey is well strained (ants recently found in a sample); that hygiene has been foremost at all stages of the production process; complete information is provided on the labels; and the price reflects the value of the bees, the industry, and your labour/expertise.

Corona Virus Update

Unfortunately, due to the Covid-19 virus, all future meetings have been halted until it is safe to proceed. This could continue beyond June, which means our AGM will be held after the latest possible due date.

The Association Incorporations Act 2009 (NSW) under s37(2) requires incorporated associations hold their annual general meeting within 6 months after the close of their financial year. A summary can also be found on the NSW Fair Trading website

Clubs that follow the ABA model constitution would have closed their financial year on 31/12/2019 and thus are required to hold their AGM by 30 June 2020, which under the current circumstances might no longer be feasible.

If you have not yet held your AGM for the 2019 financial year and due to the COVID-19 pandemic will need to defer your AGM post 30 June 2020, you would need to seek extension by submitting a Form A-11 prior to the due date.

A processing fee of \$33 might apply.

If your club has already held the AGM this year, please remember to submit the A12-T2 form to Fair Trading NSW within 1 month after the AGM, otherwise the fees will go up significantly.

These are unprecedented times, and it can only be hoped that the economy and the ability to socialise will return to normal at some time.

I will continue to distribute the newsletters, but without the coverage of meetings, content may be lacking. Please do not hesitate to supply me with material for the newsletter, or if anybody has any suggested topics or queries to cover please let me know.

Camp Creative At Bellingen - A Week in January

In January I enrolled in Bee The Change, a beekeeping course run by Trudi and Steve Hayes from the Little Star Bee Sanctuary at Missabotti. I would thoroughly recommend this course, with only twelve participants it filled up within the first few days of bookings being open. The five day course covered both European Honey bees and Native Bees.....

Bees are integral to the future of our planet and plant species – you can bee the change to help them survive. Explore cooking and fermenting with honey, making mead, purifying wax and making beeswax wraps. You'll delve into and get up close into the hives of European Honeybees, Stingless Native Bees and Native Solitary Bees. You'll develop the confidence to work with bees in your own home, including setting up hives, handling bees gently and confidently and planting a bee-friendly garden. Learn how to harvest and work with hive products, including raw honey and comb harvesting and extracting honey. You'll also assemble both a native beehive and a Nucleus Honey bee box to take home at the end of the course.

It was a great hands-on practical course and I am sure it will be run again in January 2021!

Have You Seen This Bee?

Have you seen this native bee? Recently spotted in my garden, it is smaller than the European honey bee. Its colour is black with random fluorescent blue markings similar to the colour on Blue Banded Bees. The colour comes from the bright hairs on its body and head. It lays its eggs in the nest of the Blue Banded Bee echoing the habit of the cuckoo bird – hence its name, Neon Cuckoo Bee (Thyreus nitidulus).

Bio-Security Update

The objective of the Bio-security Code of Practice is to manage diseases, decrease their spread and respond to outbreaks. Changes are designed to bring NSW into line with other states.

Beekeepers must be ready for bio-security practice from 1st July 2020.

All beekeepers must:

- Regularly inspect hives, every hive, every frame. A minimum of two inspections a year, 4 months apart or as required through the season
- Testing one hive per apiary, or stand of hives, twice a year for exotic pests, Varroa and Tropilaelaps mites, using sugar shake, uncapping drone brood or alcohol wash techniques.
- ♦ Keep active record of these activities.

And those with more than 50 hives must:

- Have a minimum knowledge of disease management
- Submit annual honey samples for AFB spore count testing
- ♦ declare compliance with regulations and keep accurate records

The principles of biosecurity include training beekeepers to observe signs of diseases and to control them. With adequate knowledge, beekeepers will be able to report notifiable diseases and help reduce their incidence.

Reportable diseases are:

- American Foulbrood
- ♦ European Foulbrood
- ♦ Chalk Brood
- Nosema

Seasonal Management

Autumn

- Inspect the frames for food stores at the beginning and at the end of autumn; hives need six frames full of honey for food over winter
- Inspect the queen. Check that the queen is active on the comb, does not have worn wings or damaged legs and that she is laying compact areas of eggs
- Re-queen if necessary

Check the brood for brood disease. Look for a solid brood pattern, not more than 10 per cent of cells empty
